





James Doss: Carrying Tradition Forward Through Lacrosse

The Upper Mattaponi Tribe takes great pride in celebrating one of its own, James Doss, as he represents his people through the game of lacrosse. James is in his first year at Marymount University, where he plays on the men's lacrosse team. Each time he gears up, he carries forward a legacy that reaches back to the earliest days of his ancestors, honoring a sport deeply rooted in Indigenous culture.

Lacrosse, known as "the Creator's Game," has been played by Indigenous peoples for centuries. For many tribes, stickball games were not merely pastimes but held deep cultural and spiritual significance. These contests served as a way to build endurance, resolve conflicts, and bring communities together. Another traditional game, shinny, involved curved sticks and a ball and was played by both men and women, demonstrating the widespread presence of stickball traditions in Indigenous cultures.

James's dedication to lacrosse brings pride to his family and community, inspiring those around him—especially his father, TJ Tupponce, a tribal citizen who is currently working to establish a lacrosse program in King William County. Seeing his son's commitment to the game and its deep roots in Indigenous heritage has strengthened TJ's own passion for expanding opportunities for young athletes. Through his efforts, the sport will reach more players who may not have otherwise had the chance to experience it, further connecting the community to a game that has been played for generations. As James steps onto the field, he carries the strength of his ancestors, representing the resilience and enduring spirit of the Upper Mattaponi Tribe.

Environmental Updates

This fall has been busy! Liz Buikema attended a U.S. Geological Survey hydrology training in Santa Fe, NM, and installed a monitoring station at Farmhouse Creek. The team joined the EPA's Regional Tribal Operations Committee conference in Richmond and a GIS summit hosted by the Chickahominy Tribe.

Johnathan Oxendine (Haliwa-Saponi) and Carrie Fox (Pamunkey) are continuing work on VCU's vessel this winter, trawling for Atlantic sturgeon and finding many invasive blue catfish.

As warmer weather approaches, the team will expand water monitoring efforts, complete water vessel training, and launch air monitoring with the new Meteorological and Air Quality Station (MAQS) at the Tribal Office.

CSA Boxes Will Expand Offerings to Include Mattaponi River Catfish

The Environmental team is addressing the invasive blue catfish issue in the local Mattaponi River by catching, processing, and freezing fish fillets to include with the Agriculture Department's CSA food boxes. This new addition will roll out this Spring, so please stay tuned for more details!





Water Issues From Storms

As many citizens in the Richmond area recently experienced, water issues can result from storms of all sizes. While it is always a good idea to have an emergency water supply, it is particularly important to prepare ahead of known weather events. Follow these tips to better prepare for water disruptions:

- Stock up on 1 gallon of water per person per day for at least 3 days.
- Purchase bottled water and keep it sealed until needed.
- Fill a bathtub, washing machine, or buckets with water before a storm to flush toilets if access is lost.
- For emergency drinking water, consider outdoor sources like rainwater, streams, or ponds.
- Treat outdoor water by boiling, chlorinating, or distilling before drinking.

Elder Care Updates

New Housekeeping Assistance Program for Elders

We are excited to introduce a new housekeeping assistance program designed to support our elders in maintaining a clean and comfortable living environment. This initiative aims to ease the burden of daily household tasks, ensuring a safe and welcoming home for those who qualify.

Eligibility for the program is based on income and is limited to a 25-mile service area from the tribal office. Applicants must provide income documentation to verify qualification and determine the appropriate level of assistance. Once approved, participants can select a cleaning schedule—weekly, bi-weekly, or monthly—that best suits their needs. Our dedicated team will provide light housekeeping services, ensuring a tidy and organized space. Be on the lookout for application materials and detailed guidelines, which will be mailed out soon!

Ride Assistance Reminder

Elder Care currently provides ride assistance for those who are unable to drive and do not have someone living within the home that can drive.
